Mrs Kírsten Stíbbon, Headteacher of our schools, writes: Since October Half Term, the children at Harpley and Great Massingham Primary Schools have continued to work hard and enjoy their time in school, despite the fact that we are still bound by Covid-19 Secure restrictions. The staff continues to work tirelessly to ensure that all our children are safe and happy and our fantastic attendance figures are a credit to their dedication. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our parents and carers for their support and trust during these unusual circumstances. During November and December, the Junior class has been finding out about life in Roman Britain. At the end of their topic, the pupils answered the question 'what did the Romans do for us?' and were able to give interesting answers based on what they had found out. Having spoken to the Junior pupils and looked at their work, I know that they particularly enjoyed finding out about Boudicca and the Iceni revolt. The Infant class has been thinking about what makes a hero; they answered the question 'am I a superhero?' at the end of their topic. I was very interested to hear them discussing whether Sir Captain Tom Moore and Guy Fawkes were heroes. The infants decided, in the end, that these men were both heroes at different times to different people for very different reasons. Our Christmas festivities were obviously very different this year but, with the support of our Parents and Friend groups, we made sure that the children didn't miss out and enjoyed the season as much as possible. Pupils enjoyed their class Christingles and Christmas lunches, complete with crackers and music. Each class held their own Christmas decoration making day and, at Harpley, Mrs B worked with each year group to record a collection of Christmas songs which was then sent out to families. This replaced the usual whole school Harpley Christmas production which all look forward to every year. We are hoping that 2021 will bring opportunities for a return to more normal routines! By the time you read this we hope you will have had a very Merry (if quiet!) Christmas. The Feast of the Epiphany 6th January

Epiphany

Apostle

An enemy whom God has made a friend, A righteous man discounting righteousness, Last to believe and first for God to send, He found the fountain in the wilderness. Thrown to the ground and raised at the same moment, A prisoner who set his captors free, A naked man with love his only garment, A blinded man who helped the world to see, A Jew who had been perfect in the law, Blesses the flesh of every other race And helps them see what the apostles saw; The glory of the lord in Jesus' face. Strong in his weakness, joyful in his pains, And bound by love, he freed us from our chains. Malcolm Guite writes:

Though the 12 days of Christmas ended at Twelfth Night and Epiphany, there is another sense in which this season, in which we reflect on the great mystery of God in Christ as an infant, continues until February 2nd, the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the **Temple.** This feast came to be called by the shorter and more beautiful name of Candlemas because the day it celebrates, recorded in <u>Luke 2:22-40</u>, is the day the old man Simeon took the baby in his arms and recognised him as

'A Light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of thy people Israel.' It became the custom of the church to light a central candle and bring it to the altar to represent the Christ-light, and also on the occasion of this feast to bless all the 'lights' or candles in the church, praying that all who saw that outward and visible light would remember also and be blessed by the inner light of Christ 'who lightens everyone who comes into the world.'

It had always been prophesied that God would one day come into the Temple that human beings had built for him, though Solomon, who built the first temple had said 'even the Heavens are too small to hold you much less this temple I have built'. Candlemas is the day we realise that eternity can come into time and touch us in the form of a tiny child, that God appears at last in His Temple, not as a transcendent overlord, but as a vulnerable pilgrim, coming in His Love to walk the road of life alongside us.

They came, as called, according to the Law. Though they were poor and had to keep things simple, They moved in grace, in quietness, in awe, For God was coming with them to His temple. Amidst the outer court's commercial bustle They'd waited hours, enduring shouts and shoves, Buyers and sellers, sensing one more hustle, Had made a killing on the two young doves.

They come at last with us to Candlemas And keep the day the prophecies came true We glimpse with them, amidst our busyness, The peace that Simeon and Anna knew. For Candlemas still keeps His kindled light, Against the dark our Saviour's face is bright.
